### **BALLARAT WEEKEND**

Wild Ballarat - Frontier Towns and Wildlife

On March 14-15, the Ballarat branch of the ITA hosted a wonderful weekend for all the incoming teaching

Fellows. For those of us able to attend, it was a fantastic opportunity to learn more about the history of Victoria and meet some of the unique wildlife of the country.

Saturday morning we met up at Sovereign Hill, a gold rush era town that gives visitors a chance to learn more about the influence that gold and mining has had on the area. With period costumes, dramas, mine tours, Red Coats, coach rides, candy-making demos, and even a school, it was fascinating to see what life was like for the first European and Chinese miners and settlers. I was surprised to hear how much gold was actually found here - in the first 9 years of mining, more gold was discovered in and around Ballarat than in the entire rest of the world combined. We were able to watch how gold bricks are made, from the initial melting of the nuggets to the pouring of molten gold into the mould, all using period-appropriate tools. For me though, the hands-on experience of getting to pan for gold in the stream myself made a huge impression. Although I won't strike it rich with the fragments I was able to find, it was very neat to be able to find and pull real gold from the water, right in the middle of Victoria!

After a busy day at Sovereign Hill, we all met up again for dinner at the Ballarat Leagues Club. The food was amazing, and the laid-back environment gave us all a chance to mingle and catch up. For most of us, this was the first time we'd seen each other since orientation, and it was great to swap stories and talk through challenges that we all were facing. With great turn out from the returned Fellows, we were able to make new contacts and hear advice from those who had been through similar experiences and lived to tell the tale! By the end of the evening, there had been many laughs and lots of numbers exchanged, many of us feeling a bit more reenergized and richer for the experience.



The next morning we all visited the Ballarat Wildlife Park, for a chance to see and learn more about some of Australia's native wildlife. For many of us, one of the highlights was being able to hand-feed kangaroos, a few of whom had a joeys in their pouch! A tour of the park gave us all a chance to see the animals before some had to head off to catch trains or rides back home. For those of us lucky enough to be able to stay a bit longer, encounters with Pickles the wombat and Molly the Koala left a real impression - one sure to be remembered long after the year is over!

On behalf of all the Fellows who attended, thanks again to **Gaye Corrigan** and helpers who organized and host such a wonderful weekend.
