Exchange experience in BC - 2016

Eleven years ago, my family and I had such a positive experience moving from the Blue Mountains (west of Sydney) on an exchange to Ontario, that we jumped at the chance to do it again. Whilst the first instance was a double teaching exchange, with both my husband and I teaching humanities in secondary schools, this time it is just myself in a counselling role. Apart from being chief family travel agent, my husband has also been involved in volunteer work helping young offenders in a Restorative Justice program run by the RCMP. Our 15 year-old daughter is attending Grade 10 and just finished the now obsolete English 10, Math 10 and Science 10 exams! Our 19 year-old son, who is on a gap year, was able to find work at Sportchek, which is most apt as he will study Sport Science at university when he returns home.

I am working in a secondary school in Surrey, about 30 kilometres southeast of Vancouver. The counselling role is similar to that back home as it typically involves individual counselling, psychoeducation and family support. However, there have also been some challenges as the role in this school district also includes course planning and post-secondary advice and some of the issues have been higher-level and more complex than those presented in a more regional setting back home. On all fronts, my colleagues have been very gracious with their time and support in answering my questions and ensuring I don't mess up too much! Additionally, my exchange partner had arranged for me to attend some post-secondary institutions to get me up to speed with relevant information. The bottom line is that I still enjoy going to work each day, which says it all.

Another very exciting part of an exchange is being able to immerse oneself into the local environment and culture and explore the surrounds. We felt very fortunate scoring British Columbia, as we did not get to see much of this beautiful part of Canada the previous time.

In Spring break, we were able to ski in Whistler on a day that was the sunniest in two weeks according to the locals! We also ventured down across the border to Seattle, grabbing some bargains along the way at an outlet mall. On weekends, we have taken up some local activities: skied and ascended the Grind at Grouse Mountain, cycled around Stanley Park, taken the seabus across to North Van, hiked Elk Mountain at Chilliwack, walked along False Creek to Granville Island and explored downtown Vancouver, Steveston, Fort Langley, Buntzen Lake and Sasamat Lake.

Thanks to BC Exchange Teachers' Association, a number of exchangees were able to explore Victoria over a long weekend in May. An organised school visit allowed us further insight into BC schools and tours of Parliament buildings and historic Victoria and Chinatown were both informative and enjoyable. There was also the opportunity to share exchange stories at optional lunches and dinners. In our spare time, we toured the spectacular Butchart Gardens.

We dropped into Princeton and Osoyoos as we made our way to Penticton to enjoy the Canada Day fireworks celebrations on Okanagan Lake. We then took in the scenic lakeside mountain views as we drove to Kelowna and Kamloops. And of course, we were able to take home some local produce – big cherries, juicy peaches and some great wine!

In a few days, we will return to Ontario to join friends in a cottage holiday on Georgian Bay and see Niagara Falls once again so that our daughter can remember her last experience when she turned on the multicoloured night lights onto the Falls.

As we do not get the chance to be in the Northern hemisphere often, we will also venture over to Europe for a couple of weeks, visiting some of the major cities.
